A NEW DIGITAL TOOL FOR DOCUMENTARY PAPYRI

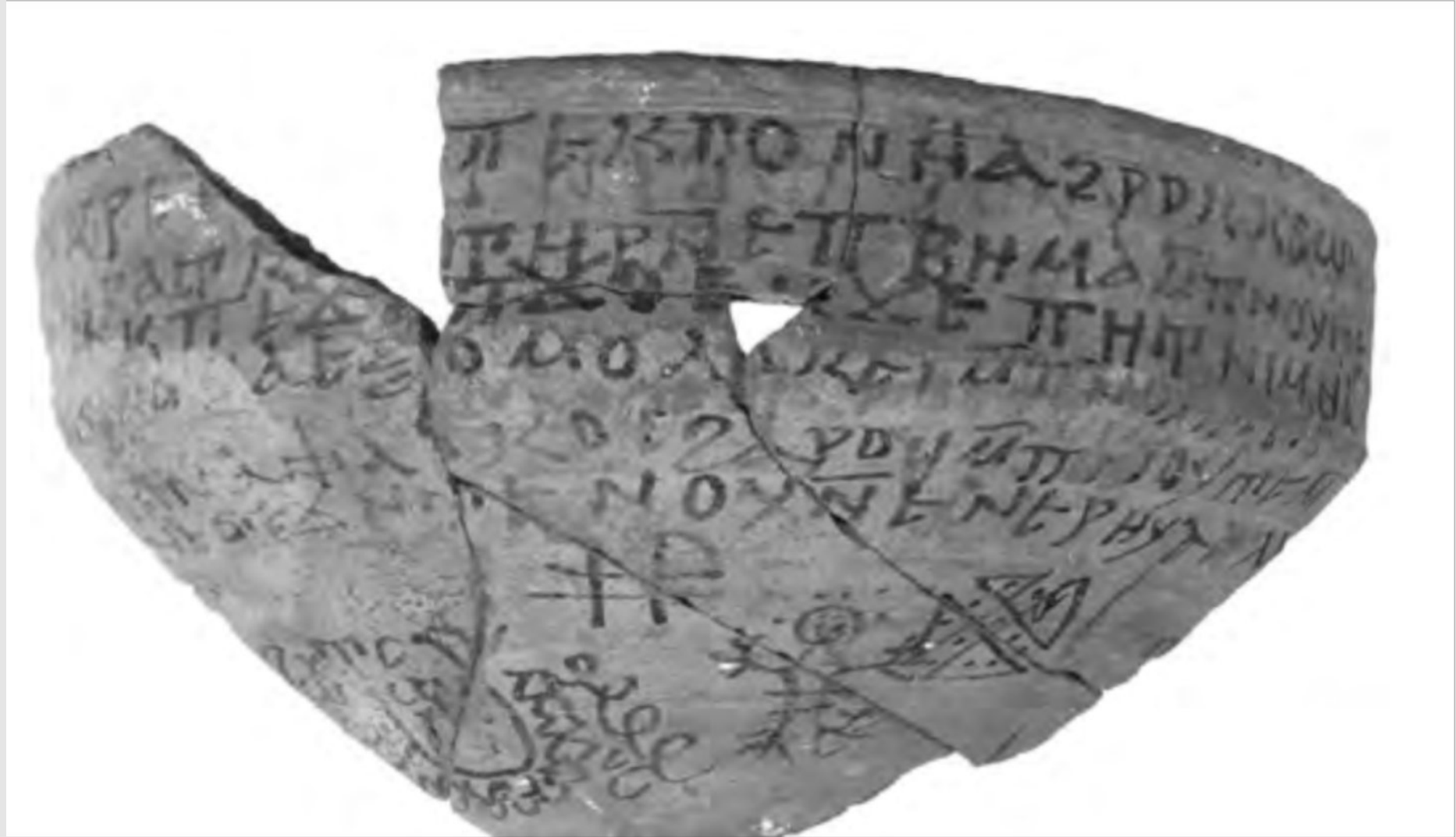
In October 2017, the European Research Council awarded a Starting Grant to Prof. Klaas Bentein for his project EVWRIT.

The project will offer for the first time:

- 1. a holistic perspective towards the ‘meaning’ of documentary texts;
- 2. an important contribution to current socio-semiotic and socio-linguistic research;
- 3. a digital tool to open up new ways to investigate Ancient texts.

A data-source for socio-semiotics analysis:

- Morpho-syntax (Klaas Bentein)
- Orthography (Geert De Mol)
- Lexicology (Emmanuel Roumanis)
- Multilingualism (Antonia Apostolakou)
- Typography (Yasmine Amory)
- Material aspects (Serena Causo)



The database aims to gather together Greek, Coptic, Latin and Arabic texts that are scattered throughout different digital tools (the *Trismegistos* database, the *Duke Databank of Documentary Papyri*, the *Heidelberger Gesamtverzeichnis der griechischen Papyrusurkunden Ägyptens*, the *Arabic Papyrology Database*, and the *Brussels Coptic Database*). For most of the documents, it will offer a translation and some explanatory notes - elements that are usually absent from electronic databases. It will allow researchers to annotate texts with **multiple layers of information**, as well as to disclose the **social meaning** of Graeco-Roman and Late Antique papyri.
